Introduction and Overview

You will create and design a 2 page spread for a graphic novel / comic book. On those pages, you will manipulate and transform images from your own photos, some images you find online, and text from a poem or song's lyrics to create a compelling narrative that can be read from start to finish.

Outcomes:

You will demonstrate that you are able to:

- Organize and design an engaging and compelling sequential narrative by combining images and text.
- Take photographs that reflect an understanding of compositional and design techniques.
- Use Adobe Photoshop, Illustrator, and a digital camera effectively to achieve specific effects.
- Employ text manipulation tools effectively.
- Reflect thoughtfully on your own creative process.

Complete and submit the following:

- Post 3 examples of comic book / graphic novel pages to Flickr folder: Graphic Novels
- Panel Organizer
- Lyrics and Story Organizer
- Final Pages (2 8.5" x 11" @ 72ppi .PDF)
- Reflection
- Master Checklist

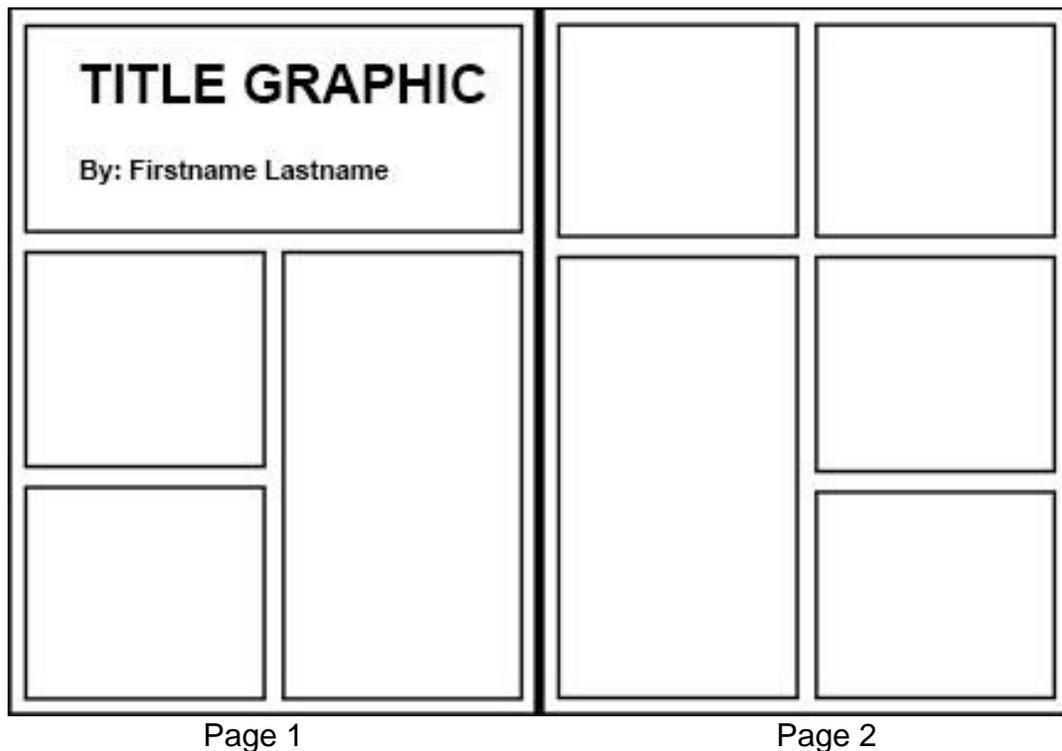

Getting Started

Step 1: Research and review

- Review the expectations for this assignment.** Carefully and completely read the requirements outlined in the Master Checklist. Read the rubric to determine level expectations, and review the additional resources on the class website.
- Research examples of comic book pages online and post 3 to Flickr.** Find pages that have interesting panel shapes and an overall design and composition that you like. Pay special attention to the Noir genre of comics: they are often created by changing photos into graphics with strong contrasts. Post your 3 examples to Flickr in a folder labeled "Graphic Novels".

Step 2: Preparation and planning

- Complete the Lyrics and Story Organizer.** Choose 2 different song lyrics to interpret. You are not expected to literally illustrate the lyrics in pictures - try combining pictures and words to create some unique juxtapositions!
- Compete the Panel Organizer.** Work out the placement of your images and text, and determine the sequence, 8-12 panel shapes, photo types (1 min.), camera angles (4 min.), and transitions (2 min.) you will include. Include your title and name at the top of page 1.
- Decide on a 3-5 colour scheme: monochromatic, analogous, or complementary.** Use the schemes included in Photoshop and Illustrator, re-visit Adobe Kuler online, or find one online.
- Gather the photographs you will need.** You can use some of the photos you've already taken throughout the semester, and you may also take new photographs. **You may not use photos that you have submitted for a grade.** Make sure you use at least 3 types of photos, 4 camera angles, and 1 photo composition principle described in the Master Checklist.
- Find up to 6 images online that you will use in addition to your photographs.** These images should be transformed using Photoshop and/or Illustrator. Combine them with your photographs and/or use them for your backgrounds.

Step 3: Exploring, creating and refining

- Lay out your two page spread using Photoshop.** Create your panel shapes and fit them on the page, and make sure the sequence is clear. Leave a ¼" border on all sides of the page, and maintain a consistent gutter width of ¼".
- Edit your photographs in Adobe Photoshop and Illustrator.** Use all of the techniques and tools listed in the Master Checklist, as well as others you have learned. Transform your images and background to achieve the look of a comic book. Format your images to fit in your panels. At least 1 image should pop out of the border of your panels.
- Create your word balloons and place your text inside them.** Differently shaped balloons change the way the text is understood. Include at least 1 sound word (onomatopoeia).
- Edit, refine, and sequence your story.** Determine what images and text to keep, adjust, or leave out. Make sure you use 2 types of transitions to help create an engaging narrative.
- Create your Title Graphic and include your first and last name.** Integrate it into your design at the upper left of your layout.

Step 4: Reflecting and evaluating

- Complete your reflection.** Answer all questions thoughtfully using specific examples.

Step 5: Submitting

- Turn in your two pages, each should be 8.5"x11".** Make sure that your pages fit together seamlessly as a double page spread. Your files should be saved as 72ppi in .PDF format.

Text / Intertextuality:	Use a poem or a song as your text. Use a clear and consistent font. Create an interesting relationship between word and image (intertextuality).	
Sound:	Incorporate a minimum of 1 example of a sound word (onomatopoeia). The shape of the letters should express the quality of the sound.	
Sequencing:	Panels should read from left to right, and top to bottom. Panels should be arranged so that the sequence, and therefore the narrative, is clear to the reader.	
Transitions:	Include a minimum of 2 types of transitions: Moment to Moment, Action to Action, Subject to Subject, Scene to Scene, Aspect to Aspect, Non-Sequitur (no relationship).	
Storytelling:	Word and text should combine sequentially to create a compelling narrative.	
Title and Author:	Include the title of your comic in the upper portion of your left page. The title should be a uniquely designed logo. Include the author's name (yours).	
Word Balloons:	Panels should combine image and text. Text should be set within an appropriately formatted balloon.	
Images:	Use original photographs you have taken to create the comic. You may use a maximum of 6 elements from found sources.	
Color Scheme:	Use a limited palette of 3-5 colours. Use the colour schemes available within AI/PS, find one online, or create your own using Adobe Kuler. Your scheme can be monochromatic, analogous, or complementary.	
Photo Composition:	Use at least 1 of the following compositional principles: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Framing • Leading Lines • Rule of Thirds 	
Design Principles:	Use 2 of the following design principles in your panels: repetition and rhythm, variety, emphasis, proportion, balance, unity and harmony, movement.	
Format:	Create a double page spread. To minimize file size and memory use it will be necessary to create 2 files at 8.5"x11" each, with a ¼" white border around all sides. Make sure the two pages can be seamlessly combined. Save your final files at 72ppi and submit them in .PDF format.	
Panels:	Include a minimum of 8 panels, and a maximum of 12 . Your panel layout should be both easily understood (top to bottom, left to right) and uniquely designed. In at least 1 of the panels, your image should pop out of the border.	
Gutters:	Your layout should include even and consistently spaced gutters around the edges of all panels, each approximately ¼" wide.

Reflection:

Your Reflection should be written using complete sentences. **Restate the question in your answer, and support your answer with specific examples.** Carefully review your responses and make sure they are complete, specific, clear, concise, and free of errors. Your response should be **typed, double-spaced, and no longer than 2 pages** in length. Include your name.

Reflection Part A:

1. Choose 1 panel to examine. What camera angle did you use and how did it contribute to the story's meaning?
2. Describe a panel where you used either macro, portrait, or landscape photography.
 - a. How did you adjust the aperture setting to achieve the depth of field you needed?
 - b. How did you use either framing, leading lines, or the rule of thirds?
3. Focus on one of your most interesting panels.
 - a. Describe how you used one specific design element or principle.
 - b. Describe 3 Photoshop or Illustrator tools or techniques you used to transform your photos to make them more interesting than the original.
4. Describe 1 part of your comic where you used a specific transition effectively. What type of transition did you use, and how did it affect the meaning of the story?
5. Describe one specific place in your layout where you used the gutter to help tell your story. How did the gutter affect how the viewer might read or understand your story?
6. Which aspect of your comic is most successful and why?
7. Which aspect of your comic would you like to reconsider? Why?

Reflection Part B:

1. Which project were you most successful with this term? Give 2 reasons why.
2. Which project would you change if you had the chance? Write 2 specific things you would do differently.
3. Which project was the most challenging technically, and why?
4. Which project was the most challenging creatively, and why?
